


East Honolulu Sustainable Communities Plan


need to couple it with keeping a watchful eye on who wants to build *what, when, where* and *how* in our community and research to see if it conforms with the EHSC Plan. If it doesn't, start asking questions and share what you learn! *For example*, did you know that the 87-acres of Kamilo Nui Valley are the last agriculture lands in East Honolulu and are *outside* the urban growth boundary (UGB)?

And, that according to the city's vision, it should remain that way through 2020? (As publicly recorded in 1999, paragraphs 2.1 - 2.2.1: "The Vision for East Honolulu") Interesting huh?
